MAKING CONNECTIONS

Over the summer, the Presbytery of the Coastlands held a series of four listening sessions. These events were for pastors and Ruling Elders, with the goal of strengthening the connections between the congregations and the presbytery, and also to encourage better connections among the various congregations of the presbytery. Berwin Guttormsen and I attended a listening Session at the First Presbyterian Church of Manasquan.

The listening sessions were moderated by our presbytery executives, the Rev. Dr. Mary Westfall and Ruling Elder Jean Woodman. These sessions also included the moderators of the Trustees of the Presbytery and the Commission on Ministry (COM). It's easy to think of "The Presbytery" as a distant entity, but these important committees are staffed by pastors and Ruling Elders, leaders who face the same challenges as us. These leaders volunteer their time to the presbytery and they are there to help congregations in need.

The Trustees are moderated by the Rev. Dr. Fred Garry, who serves as Senior Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Metuchen. The Trustees deal with all manner of property issues within the presbytery, including the sale and leasing of church property, insurance, and the financing of construction projects. And when a congregation is closed, the Trustees help to sell the church building and other real estate. Two of the most talented Ruling Elders I've ever met serve on the Trustees: Nancy Tindall (Allentown) and Walt Vincent (Hightstown). They're wonderful stewards of the church.

The COM is moderated by the Rev. Dr. Nina Reeder. Nina is honorably retired, yet she still gives of her time and knowledge to equip the saints in all of the congregations of this presbytery. The COM works closely with all congregations that are in the midst of pastoral transitions. For instance, if a congregation has neither an installed pastor, nor an interim pastor, COM will appoint someone to moderate the Session of that congregation. Currently, I am moderating the Sessions at Englishtown and Old Tennent, I do this because I'm called to serve the entire presbytery. More than that, I do this because my friend Ning asked me to. The COM also reviews the terms of call for all pastors in the presbytery and sets minimum standards of compensation for all of the clergy in this presbytery.

I'd guess that there were eight to ten Ruling Elders in attendance, including Berwin, and they asked lots of questions of our presbytery executives and committee chairs. Some of the elders were very frustrated and they asked tough questions. The presbytery leaders acknowledged the frustrations of the various elders and admitted that the transition to the new presbytery has been bumpy, and that they need to do more to connect with the congregations.

I thought it was a very productive meeting and a great way to hear what's going on in other congregations. I met several Ruling Elders whom I'd never met before and I think Berwin got to know some new folks, too. As we were driving back to Freehold, I asked Berwin what he thought. He said that he was glad to engage with other

elders and pastors and that "FPC is very much alive and well compared to other congregations within the presbytery."

We're all connected. The Presbytery of the Coastlands isn't an anonymous, distant body. It's Elder Nancy Tindall and Elder Walt Vincent. The presbytery is retired clergy, like Nina Reeder. It's pastors of big churches, like Fred Garry, and it's pastors of small and medium-sized congregations, like me. And it's all of you, too.

The Presbytery of the Coastlands needs more ordained Ruling Elders to serve on its committees. We need committed servant leaders from all our congregations. If you are an ordained Elder—even if you're not currently serving on the Session—please consider serving the greater church. The presbytery can use your time and talents and I would be grateful for your participation.




A BIT OF HISTORY

After being persecuted in Scotland, many Presbyterians came to the New World in search of religious freedom. In 1692, the Old Scots Church a.k.a. the Old Scots Meeting Hall was the place where they first met and also the site of the first Presbytery meeting in 1706. This picture of The Old Scots Burial Ground located on Free Hill in Wickatunk was likely the site of that church.



In 1730, a second church was built on White Oak Hill. Although it was originally called the Freehold Church, it was later changed to Old Tennent in honor of pastors and brothers John and William Tennent.



Since many people lived in the Village of Freehold, it was decided to erect a new church which was completed in 1837. It was aptly named "The Village Church" and started out with 32 members. It was located on what now is 57 West Main Street.




After awhile the congregation grew and the building was unable to support the increased population and activities. But even worse than that, was the integrity of the building. During the Civil War, routine maintenance could not be done because both the materials and the manpower were needed for the war. Many members no longer felt safe in that building and it was decided to build a new church.

The site of Main Street and Brinckerhoff Avenue was chosen because it was large enough to make room for horse sheds and the increased congregational size. And we still call it our church home today.

RECIPE CORNER

share a recipe or two from that cookbook.

For this issue, we shine the recipe spotlight on **Baked Potato Soup** and **Pumpkin Bread.**

BAKED POTATO SOUP

4 lg. baked potatoes 3 c. butter

2/3 c. flour

6 c. milk 3/4 tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper

4 green onions, chopped 12 slices bacon, fried and

crumbled 2 c. shredded Cheddar cheese

1 c. sour cream

Cut potatoes in half. Scoop out pulp and put in small bowl. Melt butter in a large pot. Add flour. Gradually stir in milk. Continue to stir until smooth, thickened, and bubbly. Stir in potato pulp, salt, pepper, and ¾ of the onions, bacon, and cheese. Cook until heated. Stir in sour cream. Once prepared, can be kept warm in a slow cooker on low. Serve topped with remaining onions, bacon, and cheese.

PUMPKIN BREAD

1¾ c. all-purpose flour 1½ c. granulated sugar 1 tsp. baking soda

34 tsp. salt 14 tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. ground cloves ½ tsp. ground nutmeg

½ tsp. ground cinnamon

1 c. canned pumpkin 2 lg. eggs

½ c. vegetable oil ½ c. water

1 c. finely snipped dates
1 c. chopped walnuts

Grease a 9" x 5" x 3" loaf pan. Heat oven to 350°. In a medium bowl, thoroughly mix the flour, sugar, baking soda, salt, baking powder, and spices. In a large bowl, mix pumpkin, eggs, oil, and water. Add flour mixture to pumpkin mixture and stir just until blended and smooth. Stir in dates and nuts. Scrape batter into prepared pan and bake about 1½ hours or until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean. Place pan on a wire rack to cool for 10 minutes. Turn loaf out and cool completely.
